During my academic career, I have designed, taught and examined a total of 23 different undergraduate and postgraduate courses (all but the most recent one, designed this year, taught more than once, and many taught as many as five times), all but two of them within Social Anthropology (one of the exceptions was for a Gender Studies program at Manchester, and the other was for Social and Political Sciences at Cambridge in 1993). The range of courses I have taught at Manchester, and now just beginning at Helsinki, include the following. Most were one semester courses, lasting 12 weeks, in which I would lecture for one hour, and then have seminars and discussions for a further two hours each week.

Ethnographic Methodologies Course for PhD training. Team-taught course introduced in 2015, and led by me.

Central Themes in Anthropology. 2015 and 2016. University of Helsinki, course introducing anthropological theory to social science undergraduates.

Visually Representing the Community. 2014. Aalto University, visiting program on visual techniques in the social sciences.

Anthropology of Kinship (Persons). 2012 and 2013. University of Helsinki, advanced theory course. 14 sessions. Textbook on the anthropology of persons is being developed from this course.

Borders, Frontiers and the Relocation of Europe. 2012, 2014 and 2016. University of Helsinki, 7580203 *Tutkimusala III* course, for advanced undergraduate students. 14-session course. *Annual Review* article (see above) was based on this course.

Culture and Society. First Year undergraduate course, designed to be an introductory course to theoretical approaches in anthropology.

Southern Europe. *Regional Studies of Culture* course, first year undergraduate.

Britain. *Regional Studies of Culture Course*, first year undergraduate.

The Ethnography of the Mediterranean. First year *Regional Studies* lecture course in Social Anthropology, University of Manchester

Current Anthropology at Manchester. Second year undergraduate course, designed to help students bring published texts together with the fieldwork and other research carried out by current members of staff at Manchester. I designed this course, but it was team-taught, for obvious reasons.

Political & Economic Anthropology. Second Year undergraduate course. Core course aimed at giving students a thorough background in political and economic aspects of anthropology.

Writing a dissertation proposal. Third year undergraduate course, aimed at helping students develop a research question and design the research for it.

Bodies & Embodiment. Final year undergraduate course and MA course, aimed at covering anthropological approaches towards studies of bodily existence.

Concepts of the Person. Final year undergraduate course and MA course. This was a course in anthropological theory, focusing on diverse approaches towards the study of personhood.

Gender, Sex and the Person. Final year undergraduate course and MA course, on all aspects of the anthropology of gender, sex and the person.

The Idea of Europe. Part-time undergraduate degree course in Social Anthropology, University of Manchester. This course was aimed at mature students who studied in the evenings.

Conceptualising Sex and Gender. Debates in Women's Studies undergraduate course for Women's Studies Department, University of Manchester.

MA/Diploma Ethnography Reading Seminar for MA or Postgraduate Diploma in Social Anthropology. This course was designed to train MA students in a thorough understanding of ethnographic monographs.

MA Options Seminar. MA course to train students in their discretionary optional courses.

Issues in Ethnographic Research. First year doctoral and advanced MA student course. This course is designed to help students develop their research questions and, in particular, bring those questions into relation with both ethical issues and research methods.

Concepts of Person and Social Theory. MA Advanced Anthropology course. A course on advanced social theory, using the concept of person as a focus.

Postgraduate Research Seminar. Pre and post-fieldwork doctoral candidate research seminar. This is a seminar in which doctoral students present their work and receive feedback from their peers and from the seminar facilitator.
